

Wheelock Ch. 27: ALLEY CAT

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Caelī, Lesbia nostra, Lesbia illa,
illa Lesbia, quam Catullus ūnam
plūs quam sē atque suōs amāvit omnēs,
nunc in quadriviis et angiportīs
glūbit magnanimī Remī nepōtēs.

(*Catullus 58; meter: hendecasyllabic.-Caelius, a rival of Catullus for Lesbia's favors.-**quadrivium**, -ī, crossroads.-**angiportum**, -ī, alley.-**glūbō**, **glūbere**, to peel (back), strip (off); used of stripping the bark off trees or the skin off an animal, here in an obscene sense.-**Remus**, brother of Romulus, legendary founders of Rome.)

A single sentence with a relative clause (here bracketed in italics):

illa Lesbia, [*quam Catullus ūnam*
plūs quam sē atque suōs amāvit omnēs,]
